Hollywood Chinese: The Arthur Dong Collection Exhibition / October 23, 2009 – May 31, 2010

Hollywood Chinese: The Arthur Dong Documentary Collection presents selections from over 800 pieces of movie memorabilia that was collected during the ten-year research for Arthur Dong's groundbreaking film, Hollywood Chinese. Through posters, lobby cards, film stills, and scripts and documents dating from 1912, visitors journey into a vivid and graphic study of how Chinese have been imagined in the movies, reflecting the social and cultural history of the Chinese in America during the last century. In addition to iconic depictions evidenced by material from films such as The Good Earth, The Vengeance of Fu Manchu, Charlie Chan in Honolulu, and Flower Drum Song, highlights of the collection include the surviving archive of pioneer Chinese American filmmaker James B. Leong, who produced the 1921 film, Lotus Blossom, in Los Angeles.

Filmmaker Arthur Dong is the Guest Curator for this exhibition.

Explore the cultural and historical significance of tea-after water, the world's most consumed beverage-through a magnificent and wide-ranging survey of visual art. Chinese paintings; Japanese screens, ceramics, and prints; rare English and Colonial American paintings; photographs and historical documents; tea-serving paraphernalia from around the globe; and much more, all tell the fascinating history of tea drinking. The subjects of the exhibition range from tea's mythic origins in the hills of South China through its enormous significance in Japan, its introduction in Europe by Dutch traders around 1610, its role in colonial American life beyond the clichés of the Boston Tea Party, and finally to its expanding importance as a global commodity at the height of the British Empire.

Japanese American Resettlement through the Lens: Hikaru Iwasaki and the WRA's Photographic Section, 1943-1945

In Japanese American Resettlement through the Lens, Lane Ryo Hirabayashi gathers a unique collection of photographs by War Relocation Authority photographer Hikaru Iwasaki, the only full-time WRA photographer from the period still living. This book explores the WRA's use of photography in its mission to encourage "loyal" Japanese Americans to return to society before the end of the war, and also to convince Euro-Americans that this was safe and advantageous. Hirabayashi assesses the relative success of this project, and discusses how, although they were created as part of the government's official record, the WRA photos can be appropriated and utilized for other purposes, today.

While previous articles and books have discussed specific photographers, such as Dorothea Lange, Ansel Adams, Russell Lee, and Toyo Miyatake, no author has considered the institutional dimensions of the WRA's photo operations as a whole, including the set up and operation of the WRA Photography Section [WRAPS] in downtown Denver, Colorado. Drawing from archival sources and interviews, Hirabayashi delineates the mission, method, and make up of WRAPS. The book is thus an original contribution to the history of mass incarceration, and an illustration of the federal government's refinement in its use of institutional photography as a tool for shaping public opinion in favor of its policies.
