Nov 11 Nisei Soldiers Break Their Silence by Linda Tamura 2.4PM

Nisei Soldiers Break Their Silence is a compelling story of courage, community, endurance, and reparation. It shares the experiences of Japanese Americans (Nisei) who served in the U.S. Army during World War II, fighting on the front lines in Italy and France, serving as linguists in the South Pacific, and working as cooks and medics. The soldiers were from Hood River, Oregon, where their families were landowners and fruit growers. Town leaders, including veterans' groups, attempted to prevent their return after the war and stripped their names from the local war memorial. All of the soldiers were American citizens, but their parents were Japanese immigrants and had been imprisoned in camps as a consequence of Executive Order 9066. The racist homecoming reception that the Hood River Japanese American soldiers received was decried across the nation.

Linda Tamura, who grew up in Hood River and whose father was a veteran of the war, conducted extensive oral histories with the veterans, their families, and members of the community. She had access to hundreds of recently uncovered letters and documents from private files of a local veterans' group that led the campaign against the Japanese American soldiers. This book also includes the little known story of local Nisei veterans who spent 40 years appealing their convictions for insubordination.

Linda Tamura is professor of education at Willamette University in Salem, Oregon. She is the author of The Hood River Issei: An Oral History of Japanese Settlers in Oregon's Hood River Valley.

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November 10 "Peace Through Music" concert

The Pasadena Human Relations Commission" is proud to, present it's 14th annual "Peace Through Music" concert on Saturday November 10th at 7:30 PM. The concert will take place in the 1400 seat sanctuary of the First church of the Nazarene, 3700 E. Sierra Madre Blvd., Pasadena.

After the bombing of Pearl Harbor, over 70,000 American citizens of Japanese ancestry were forcibly removed from their West Coast homes and indefinitely detained in American style concentration camps. Located in the badlands of America. These Americans and their immigrant parents spent up to three years locked up behind: barbed wire fences, surrounded by machine guns and guard towers. Today, the living survivors of these camps are in their 70's, 80's and 90's. This is a tribute to this group of Americans who truly know what it means to be free—and learn what can happen to American citizens when that freedom is taken away.

The concert is a dedication to survivors and their families and will benefit "Pasadena Human Relations Commission" programs as well as Keiro Senior HealthCare, the Japanese American retirement home of many survivors. We have several International Artists taking part in this concert as well as other accomplished Artists, including singer "Mary Kageyama Nomura" aka "Songbird of Manzanar". Ms. Nomura kept the hopes alive of all the detainees in the camps by singing songs on a daily basis at the age of 16. She will honor guests with her songs once again at a young age of 87.
