March 13-July 12, 2014 LA Heat: Taste Changing Condiments, is an art exhibition exploring the impact of Sriracha and Tapatio in Los Angeles. The exhibit will include a curated selection of artwork from artists of diverse backgrounds who are passionate and reflective about notions of identity, community, and foodways.

Sriracha and Tapatio hot sauces are two examples of the recent homegrown all-American condiments that have dramatically impacted American cuisine. The rise in popularity of these condiments signifies an increase in Asian and Latino populations living in the US and especially in Los Angeles after the passing of the Immigration and Nationality Act in 1965. In 1971, Mexican immigrant Jose-Luis Saavedra, Sr., started Tapatio Hot Sauce, a unique combination of red chili peppers, spices and a hint of garlic, in a warehouse in Maywood, California. David Tran, an immigrant from Vietnam of Chinese ancestry, started making Thai-inspired Sriracha sauce blended fromchili peppers, vinegar, garlic in small shop in Los Angeles Chinatown in 1983. In large American cities everywhere, both Sriracha and Tapatio contend to rival Heinz Ketchup and French's mustard as the all-American condiment for the Y-Generation, for these hot sauces have become interwoven into the American cultural fabric and thus becoming an ubiquitous condiment in American cuisine.

As Japanese tattoos have moved into the mainstream, the artistry and legacy of Japanese tattooing remain both enigmatic and misunderstood. Often copied by practitioners and aficionados in the West without regard to its rich history, symbolism, or tradition, the art form is commonly reduced to a visual or exotic caricature. Conversely, mainstream Japanese culture still dismisses the subject itself as underground, associating it more with some of its clientele than with the artists practicing it. About the Lecture

Former U.S. Ambassador to Pakistan Cameron Munter will outline some of Pakistan's current challenges and place them in the context of recent U.S.-Pakistani relations. His talk will include a discussion of new approaches to Pakistan based on regional

initiatives, which might enable it to confront and overcome long-standing difficulties. Ambassador Munter will also table suggestions for how the United States could play a different, and perhaps more effective, role in the region.

About the Speaker

Ambassador Cameron Munter was born in California in 1954. A graduate of Cornell University, he earned a doctoral degree in modern European history from Johns Hopkins University. He has studied at the Jagiellonian University in Krakow, Poland; the University of Freiburg, Germany; and, as the recipient of a German Academic Exchange Service stipend, at the University of Marburg in Germany.

Ambassador Munter served as a U.S. Foreign Service Officer for nearly three decades before his retirement in 2012. He served as Ambassador to Pakistan from 2010 to 2012, guiding U.S.-Pakistani relations through a period of severe crisis, including the operation against Osama Bin Laden in Abbottabad. He previously served as Ambassador to Serbia (2007–2009).

Ambassador Munter's Foreign Service career included two terms in Iraq, where he led the first Provincial Reconstruction Team in Mosul in 2006 and served as Deputy Chief of Mission in Baghdad in 2010. Other overseas postings included Poland and the Czech Republic. In Washington, DC, Munter served as director for Central Europe at the National Security Council under Presidents Clinton and Bush, and chief of staff of the NATO Enlargement Ratification Office at the U.S. Department of State.

Among his many honors, Ambassador Munter has been awarded the U.S. State Department's Distinguished Service Award, the Gold Medal of the Polish Army, and the Masaryk Medal of the Czech Republic.

Ambassador Munter is currently professor in the practice in international relations at Pomona College in Claremont, California; a non-resident fellow of Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government; and a member of the American Academy of Diplomacy.

April 5, 2014 Hidden Legacy: Japanese Traditional Arts in the World War II Internment Camps

For over twenty years, executive producer Shirley Kazuyo Muramoto, a teacher and performer of the 13-stringed Japanese zither known as the koto, has researched the history of Japanese traditional performing arts as practiced in the camps. She tracked down, located, and interviewed both teachers and students from most of the ten main prison camps. Her fascination with the subject began after discovering that her mother, who taught her the koto, first learned the instrument as a child in the Topaz and Tule Lake camps. The mystery of how anyone could get the 6-foot long instrument into the camps when internees were only allowed to bring what they could carry sparked her quest to find out how Japanese Americans managed to carry on their art traditions under the watchtowers of the camps.

The cultural traditions that had always tied Japanese American immigrants to their faraway homeland, now came to serve as a solace during their wartime incarceration. In the vibrating strings of the koto and shamisen, the graceful moves of buyo and obon dance, the emotional release of shigin singing, or the stylized dramatics of kabuki and gidayu, an escape from the bleak predicament of the camps became possible, if only for a moment through these arts.
