April 24 REBEL WITH A CAUSE: THE LIFE OF AIKO HERZIG YOSHINAGA Sunday, April 24 1:00 PM Downtown Independent Tuesday, April 26 4:30 PM Japanese American National Museum VISUAL COMMUNICATIONS ALUMNUS JANICE D. TANAKA has been active in the film and media industry for over 30 years. Aside from working as a producer and educator, Tanaka has also served as the Manager for Diversity Development at Fox, where she worked on initiatives to employ professionals of color. Her works WHEN YOU'RE SMILING: THE DEADLY LEGACY OF INTERNMENT (1999) and RIGHT OF PASSAGE (2014) have anchored key moments in Japanese American history. Tanaka's latest documentary feature, REBEL WITH A CAUSE: THE LIFE OF AIKO HERZIG YOSHINAGA, is an endearing and essential portrait of a woman whose discovery of premeditated governmental misconduct during the WWII was crucial — not only to the landmark 1987 coram nobis cases of Gordon Hirabayashi, Fred Koramatsu and Minoru

Yasui, but also the National Council for Japanese Americans Redress (NCJAR) lawsuit of 1983.

Civil Rights Today: The Legacy of Minoru Yasui

Minoru "Min" Yasui was a young Nisei attorney in Oregon during World War II when he violated the military curfew imposed upon all persons of Japanese ancestry in order to bring a test case to court. He lost that case in the U.S. Supreme Court, but nearly 40 years later he reopened it as part of the coram nobis litigation brought by young Sansei attorneys in 1983. Recognized posthumously by President Obama with a Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2015, Yasui was not only a key player in both of those struggles, but also an outspoken, deeply committed activist all his life, working tirelessly for the human and civil rights of all people.

The year 2016 marks Yasui's 100th birthday and the 74th anniversary of his voluntary arrest. This special event will pay tribute to Yasui's courage and leadership, his lifetime of service, and the civil rights legacy that he left behind.

Honorary Chair will be Irene Hirano-Inouye, President of the U.S.-Japan Council and former JANM President. Speakers will include Peggy Nagae, Esq., a noted redress activist and the lead attorney in reopening Yasui's WWII case; Holly Yasui, youngest daughter of Min and True Yasui; and Dr. Irum Siekh, a filmmaker, oral historian, scholar, and author of the book *Detained Without Cause: Muslims' Stories of Detention and Deportation in America after 9/11*. Holly will also screen an excerpt from her upcoming documentary film, *Never Give Up! Minoru Yasui and the Fight for Justice*. More speakers to be announced; please check back for updates.

Tales of the Distant Past: The Story of Hong Kong and the Chinese Diaspora (A Tribute from the Tung Wah Group of Hospitals of Hong Kong)

October 6, 2015 - October 9, 2016

Millions of Chinese have emigrated overseas since the 1850s. Although known more for its pivotal position as a port city, Hong Kong was also a gateway for the Chinese diaspora, facilitating the migration of Chinese to over 135 different countries worldwide.

Tales of the Distant Past: The Story of Hong Kong and the Chinese Diaspora (A Tribute from the Tung Wah Group of Hospitals in Hong Kong) explores the factors leading to this mass migration and examines the role of both Hong Kong and the Tung Wah Group of Hospitals in supporting the needs of Chinese living in Hong Kong and abroad. Established in 1870, the Tung Wah Group of Hospitals is the longest standing and largest philanthropic organization in Hong Kong.

Two Views: Photographs by Ansel Adams and Leonard Frank examines the forced incarceration of citizens of Japanese descent who were living in the western coastal regions.
